MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE DUPAGE WATER COMMISSION HELD ON THURSDAY, MAY 16, 2013 600 E. BUTTERFIELD ROAD ELMHURST, ILLINOIS

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Zay at 7:30 P.M.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Commissioner Broda moved to approve the Minutes of the April 18, 2013 Regular Meeting of the DuPage Water Commission. Seconded by Commissioner Pruyn and unanimously approved by a Voice Vote.

All voted aye. Motion carried.

TREASURER REPORT

Treasurer Ellsworth presented the April 2013 Treasurer's Report, consisting of six pages.

Treasurer Ellsworth pointed out the \$65MM of cash and investments on page 1, noting a decrease of \$3.4MM from the previous month due to the \$5MM payment made to Northern Trust Bank towards the Debt Certificate. Treasurer Ellsworth also pointed out the schedule of investments on pages 2, 3, and 4 totaling \$62MM and the market yield on the total portfolio showed 42 basis points which was a slight improvement from the prior month. Treasurer Ellsworth pointed out the investment balance and the O&M account which decreased slightly under \$5MM. On page 5, the statement of cash flows showed a decrease in cash and investments by \$12MM and operating activities increased cash by \$2MM. Treasurer Ellsworth noted that it had been a good year for sales tax as the sales tax receipts showed an increase in cash of \$33MM which was up 3.7% from the prior year. Debt service payments totaled \$40MM with capital assets totaling \$2.4MM. On page 6, the monthly cash/operating report showed that the Commission had met or exceeded all of its reserve requirements and approximately \$70.4MM of outstanding debt in Table 3, Rows H, I and J.

Treasurer Ellsworth concluded his report by noting that at year end on April 30th, the Commission's revenues had exceeded expenditures by \$26.8MM which was \$8MM under budget noting it had been a great year for the Commission financially as staff had done a good job at managing its annual budget.

<u>Commissioner Murphy moved to accept the April 2013 Treasurer's Report.</u> Seconded by Commissioner Russo and unanimously approved by a Voice Vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Finance Committee – Reported by Commissioner Suess

Commissioner Suess reported that the Finance Committee reviewed and recommended for approval all action items listed on the Finance Committee Agenda and gave a brief summary of each item.

With regards to Ordinance No. O-3-13, Commissioner Suess explained that approval of the ordinance would reduce the existing interest rate on the Debt Certificate with Northern Trust Bank currently at 125 basis points plus Libor to 75 basis points plus Libor for an approximate savings of \$125,000 per year.

With regards to Resolution No. R-16-13, Commissioner Suess stated that the final payment of \$3MM plus interest would be made to West Suburban Bank on June 21st.

General Manager Spatz replied yes and explained that the Commission's goal would be to make additional payments throughout the year and as long as the Commission elects the one month reset interest period, additional payments could be made at any month.

Commissioner Suess concluded his report by noting that the Finance Committee met with the Commission's Financial Advisor, PFM, to review the quarterly update and that the investments on the reserve funds had been going very well as the approximate \$43MM that PFM manages was earning around 44 basis points.

Commissioner Crawford reported that the Administration Committee reviewed and recommended for approval all action items listed on the Administration Committee Agenda. After Commissioner Crawford gave a brief summary of each item, she welcomed any questions.

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act Regulating Wages of Laborers, Mechanics and Other Workers Employed in Any Public Works by the State, County, City or Any Public Body or Any Political Subdivision or By Anyone Under Contract for Public Works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, being Act 130 (Prevailing Wage Act), of Chapter 820 (Employment), of the Illinois Compiled Statutes, 820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq. (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the DuPage Water Commission investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in the Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the localities of DuPage County and Cook County employed in the construction of public works for the DuPage Water Commission; and

WHEREAS, "locality" is defined in the Act as the County where the physical work upon public works is performed and the public works of the DuPage Water Commission will be performed in both DuPage and Cook County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the DuPage Water Commission as follows:

SECTION ONE: To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in DuPage County for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the DuPage Water Commission, which physical work is being performed on public works in DuPage County, is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for

construction work in the DuPage County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 2013. A copy of that determination is attached hereto, and by this reference incorporated herein, as Exhibit A. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages in DuPage County by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and shall apply to any and all public works construction in DuPage County undertaken by the Commission.

SECTION TWO: To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in Cook County for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the DuPage Water Commission, which physical work is being performed on public works in Cook County, is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the Cook County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 2013. A copy of that determination is attached hereto, and by this reference incorporated herein, as Exhibit B. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages in Cook County by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and shall apply to any and all public works construction in Cook County undertaken by the Commission.

SECTION THREE: The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance that are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply the general prevailing rate of wages for DuPage County and for Cook County as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works

construction of the DuPage Water Commission conducted in DuPage County and Cook
County, respectively, to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION FOUR: The Clerk of the DuPage Water Commission shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the DuPage Water Commission this determination of the prevailing rate of wages for DuPage County and for Cook County.

<u>SECTION FIVE</u>: The General Manager is hereby directed to:

- (a) promptly file, no later than July 19, 2013, a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois;
- (b) cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice of the adoption of this Ordinance, within thirty (30) days of its filing with the Secretary of State and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body;
- (c) mail a copy of this determination to any employer, to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rate; and
- (d) attach a copy of this determination or of the revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect to all public works construction contract specifications.

IRON WORKERS AND FENCE ERECTOR (WEST) - West of Route 53.

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

TRAFFIC SAFETY - work associated with barricades, horses and drums used to reduce lane usage on highway work, the installation and removal of temporary lane markings, and the installation and removal

of temporary road signs.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN

Low voltage installation, maintenance and removal of telecommunication facilities (voice, sound, data and video) including telephone and data inside wire, interconnect, terminal equipment, central offices, PABX, fiber optic cable and equipment, micro waves, V-SAT, bypass, CATV, WAN (wide area networks), LAN (local area networks), and ISDN (integrated system digital network), pulling of wire in raceways, but not the installation of raceways.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone,

granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

- Class 4. Air Compressor; Combination Small Equipment Operator; Directional Boring Machine; Generators; Heaters, Mechanical; Hydraulic Power Unit (Pile Driving, Extracting, or Drilling); Light Plants, All (1 through 5); Pumps, over 3" (1 to 3 not to exceed a total of 300 ft.); Pumps, Well Points; Vacuum Trucks (excluding hose work); Welding Machines (2 through 5); Winches, 4 Small Electric Drill Winches.
- Class 5. SkidSteer Loader (all); Brick Forklifts; Oilers.
- Class 6. Field Mechanics and Field Welders
- Class 7. Dowell Machine with Air Compressor; Gradall and machines of like nature.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

- Class 1. Two or three Axle Trucks. A-frame Truck when used for transportation purposes; Air Compressors and Welding Machines, including those pulled by cars, pick-up trucks and tractors; Ambulances; Batch Gate Lockers; Batch Hopperman; Car and Truck Washers; Carry-alls; Fork Lifts and Hoisters; Helpers; Mechanics Helpers and Greasers; Oil Distributors 2-man operation; Pavement Breakers; Pole Trailer, up to 40 feet; Power Mower Tractors; Self-propelled Chip Spreader; Skipman; Slurry Trucks, 2-man operation; Slurry Truck Conveyor Operation, 2 or 3 man; Teamsters; Unskilled Dumpman; and Truck Drivers hauling warning lights, barricades, and portable toilets on the job site.

Five axle trucks; Dump Crets and Adgetors 7 yards and over; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnatrailers or turnapulls when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment over 16 cubic yards; Explosives and/or Fission Material Trucks; Mixer Trucks 7 yards or over; Mobile Cranes while in transit; Oil Distributors, 1-man operation; Pole Trailer, over 40 feet; Pole and Expandable Trailers hauling material over 50 feet long; Slurry trucks, 1-man operation; Winch trucks, 3 axles or more; Mechanic--Truck Welder and Truck Painter.
- Class 4. Six axle trucks; Dual-purpose vehicles, such as mounted crane trucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic; Self-loading equipment like P.B. and trucks with scoops on the front.

TERRAZZO FINISHER

The handling of sand, cement, marble chips, and all other materials that may be used by the Mosaic Terrazzo Mechanic, and the mixing, grinding, grouting, cleaning and sealing of all Marble, Mosaic, and Terrazzo work, floors, base, stairs, and wainscoting by hand or machine, and in addition, assisting and aiding Marble, Masonic, and Terrazzo Mechanics.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing

sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

Approval of Change Order No. 1 would authorize, at no change to the Contract Price, the following changes to the Contract: 1) Grant a 51 calendar day time extension thus establishing a revised Contract Completion Date of June 20, 2013, 2) Grant Final Acceptance of The Work and release Final Payment to The Contractor.

With regard to Item No. 1: Industry protocol recommends that owners of impressed current rectifiers provide notification of pending rectifier start up to owners of other utility companies whose facilities might be influence by the rectifier's output. This practice is intended to allow the operator of the new rectifier to coordinate an onsite meeting with representatives of other facilities for the purpose of witnessing rectifier testing, and to determine the presence, or absence, of stray current potentials on those facilities. The Contractor's Corrosion Specialist for the project, CPM Inc., experienced multiple delays when attempting to coordinate and schedule a meeting with owner representatives of the other interested pipeline companies prior to rectifier start up. Because of these delays Staff is recommending a 51 calendar day time extension and establishing a Revised Contract Completion Date of June 20, 2013,

With regard to Item No.2: Staff has conducted a Final Inspection of the Work and has found the Contractor to be in compliance with Article 5.4B of the Contract and is hereby recommending Granting Final Acceptance of The Work, and requesting that Final Payment be made to the Contractor in accordance with Article 5.4C of the Contract.

Approval of this Change Order would revise the Contract Price in the net amount of \$0.00 which is within the cost range estimated by the Engineer, and does not authorize or necessitate an increase in the Contract Price that is 50% or more of the original Contract Price nor, based upon the Contractor's sworn certification, authorize or necessitate an increase in the price of any subcontract under the Contract that is 50% or more of the original subcontract price

Sensus has obsoleted the 8" and 10" W Series Turbo meters and as of January 1, 2014 spare parts will no longer be available for purchase. There are 107 - 8" and 60 - 10" meters installed in the system since 1997 and 1998 respectively and the life expectancy is 25 to 30 years. We perform are own maintenance, repair, and calibration of the water meters and will require parts to keep the meters working properly and accurately for the next 10 years or so. HD Supply Waterworks is the exclusive distributor for Sensus Metering Systems in the Chicago and Northern Illinois market.

Even though this expense was budgeted in the Annual Management Budget, Board approval is required due to the sole source supply.
